ARSONISTS have stolen up to six cars and then torched them in the

The latest theft was last Sunday when thieves stole two vehicles, dumped them in Macclesfield and then set them alight.

It took the Macclesfield Fire Brigade 20 minutes to get the fires under control.

This has prompted warnings from the Macclesfield Fire Brigade and Belgrave police, who are urging

they lose them.

Macclesfield Fire Brigade captain Sharon Merritt said the fire brigade was called out to Swales and Macclesfield roads last Sunday about 4.20am. She said when firefighters arrived, no one was there and it appeared the cars had been stolen, dumped and set alight.

This was the fourth car torching the fire brigade had attended within a month. The other burning cars were in Cockatoo.

Ms Merritt said that prior to this

Sen-Sgt Tracey Leitch, of the Belgrave police, said the number of stolen cars set alight had increased significantly.

And she warned if it continued it would be extremely dangerous in the tinder-dry conditions in the hills over summer.

Sen-Sgt Leitch said vandals torched stolen cars for a number of reasons, including destroying evidence and the thrill of setting fire
